- 2. True. When the Roman king Numa Pompilius revised the Roman calendar, he made January the first month.
- 3. (D) Royalty. Daffodils are typically white, orange, or pale yellow blooms.
- 4. Basketball. The first NCAA Division I men's basketball tournament was played in 1939 and had only eight teams. Today, the event includes 68 teams.
- 5. (B) "O Captain! My Captain!" was written by Walt Whitman.
- 6. True. The birthstone is aquamarine.
- 7. (A) *The Deer Hunter*. **Fun fact:** In 1959, he began his professional career using the name Ronnie Walken.
- 8. (D) Liz Claiborne. The company made the list in 1986, and Claiborne was elected chairman of the board and CEO of the company the following year.
- 9. (D) CBS Evening News. He had worked on the show for 19 years and established himself as "the most trusted man in America." Dan Rather replaced Cronkite and went on to anchor the CBS Evening News even longer—a whopping 24 years.
- 10. Aretha Franklin. In 1987, she became the first woman inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame.
- 11. False. March's zodiac sign Pisces runs from February 19 to March 20 and is represented by two fish. March's zodiac sign Aries is represented by a ram and runs from March 21 to April 19.
- 12. (B) Miss Julie. Miss Julie was written by August Strindberg.
- 13. (B) *The Godfather*. For his work on *The Godfather* trilogy series, Coppola won four of the seven Oscars for which he was nominated.
- 14. Julius and Ethel Rosenberg. Both President Harry Truman and President Dwight Eisenhower denied their requests for clemency, and the Rosenbergs were executed in June 1953.
- 15. False. Mars was the ancient Roman god of war, not Greek.
